

Parallel Presenters Announced for 2019 Conference

William Baker, editor of SCJ and director of the SCJ conference, announces twenty-seven parallel sessions for 2019. The majority of the papers are in Bible, with ten in New Testament and nine in Old Testament. Four deal with the Stone-Campbell Movement, and another four are uncategorized.

These join fourteen study groups with, two or three papers in most of those, plus the six student paper finalists and one Isaac Errett paper winner total papers total for the conference.
